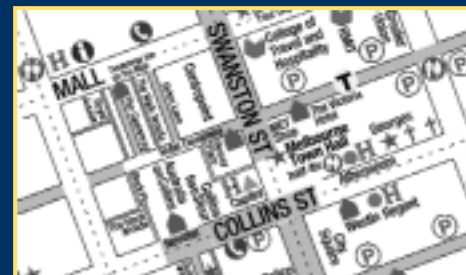

Nicola Roxon MP
Shadow Attorney General
Shadow Minister Assisting the Leader on the Status of Women

Nicola Roxon has had several Parliamentary responsibilities over the last six years including Shadow Minister for Children and Youth and Shadow Minister for Population and Immigration. She was awarded the Supreme Court Prize for top law graduate of the University of Melbourne in 1990. Nicola later became a Senior Associate (Industrial) at Maurice, Blackburn & Co. and was a Judge's Associate at the High Court in Canberra.

Professor Marcia Neave
Chairperson of the Victorian Law Reform Commission

Professor Neave is a graduate of the University of Melbourne and a fellow of the Academy of the Social Sciences in Australia. She is currently on leave from Monash University where she holds a personal chair in the Law Faculty. The Victorian Law Reform Commission has received a reference from the Attorney-General to examine laws affecting privacy in the workplace.

Vice President Iain Ross
Vice President of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission

Iain Ross has been a Vice President of the Australian Industrial Relations Commission since March 1994. Prior to his appointment he was an Assistant Secretary of the ACTU. Iain is a part-time lecturer in the Law Faculty of Sydney University and a part-time member of the Victorian Law Reform Commission.

Michael Gadiel
Deputy Assistant Secretary of the Labor Council of NSW

Michael formulated the "Who's Watching You @ Work Campaign" and has been the key driver behind the NSW push for workplace privacy legislation. He has assisted a range of organisations and unions in the development of their email and Internet policies.

Michael's responsibilities at the Labor Council include energy, health, education and training, information technology and the Internet. He has been responsible for building and managing the Labor Council of NSW's website, "LaborNET" over the last seven years.

Neil Coulson
Chief Executive Officer
Victorian Employer's Chamber of Commerce and Industry (VECCI)

VECCI is Victoria's most influential employer organisation, servicing over 25,000 Victorian businesses per annum. Neil was appointed Chief Executive Officer in August 2001. Neil's background has focused on Human Resources Management and Industrial Relations and he has worked in a variety of industries including heavy engineering, construction, transport, local government and not-for-profit organisations.

Simone Bingham
Barrister at Law

During her time at Maurice Blackburn Cashman, Simone was responsible for the conduct of a number of high profile industrial and employment law cases. Simone's pro bono work on the Childcarers' Case was acknowledged with a Highly Commended Award in the Law category of the 2003 Human Rights Awards sponsored by the Australian Human Rights and Equal Opportunities Commission.

Bill Shorten
AWU National and Victorian Secretary

Bill Shorten is the National Secretary and Victorian State Secretary of the Australian Worker's Union – the first person in the union's 118-year history to hold both positions. Bill is a member of the ALP National Executive, the Victorian ALP Administrative Committee, the ACTU Executive and the Board of the Superannuation Trust of Australia. He serves on several Government advisory boards.

Dr Yossi Berger
Director of AWU National OHS Unit

The majority of Yossi's work involves workplace inspections in many industries. This is where he believes improvements can best be made rather than at a plethora of meetings and debates. Yossi previously worked for five years as research officer of the ACTU/Victorian Trades Hall Council OHS Unit, including three years as its Director.
